evergreen	An evergreen tree keeps its green leaves all year round, even in the winter.

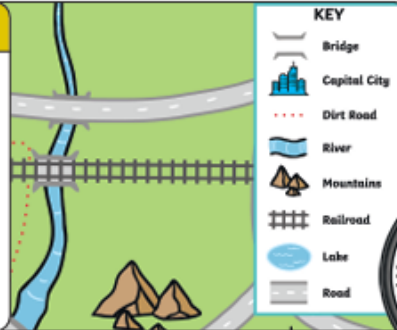

Compass

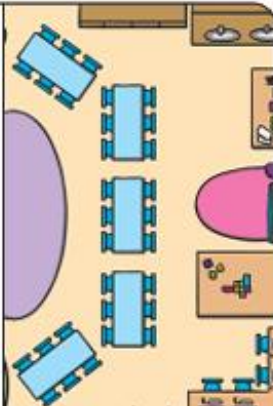
A compass can be used to help you find your way. It shows four directions - north, east, south and west. It is useful to people who are, for example, navigating ships and aircraft, explorers, builders, etc.



Symbols show what different things or places can be found in an area.

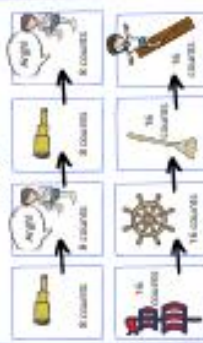

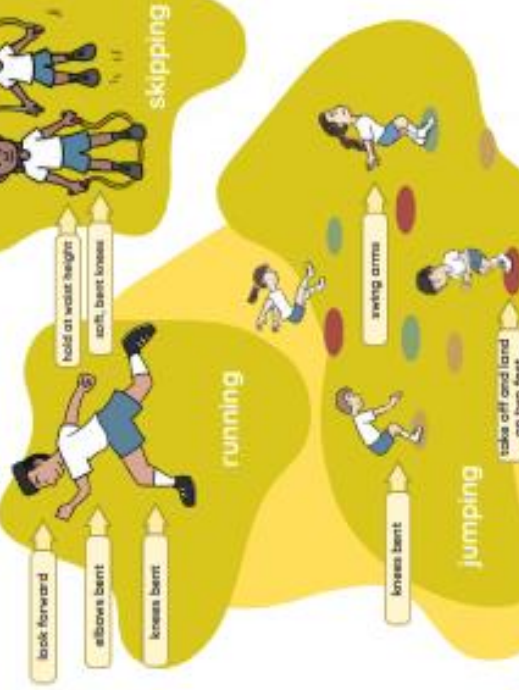

Fundamental movement skills are like the building blocks of all the fun things your body can do. They're special moves that help you play, explore, and stay active.



Ladder Knowledge

Running:

Bending your knees will help you to change direction if you swing your arms. It will help you to run faster.

Balancing:

Looking ahead will help you to balance. Landing on your feet helps you to balance.

Jumping:

Landing on the balls of your feet helps you to land with control.

Hopping:

Hop with a soft bent knee.

Skipping:

Use the opposite arm to leg when you skip. Jumping on the balls of your feet helps you to keep a rhythm.

Skipping Challenges

What you need: a skipping rope or a skipping spinner rope (the fun together to make it long!)

Challenge 1: How many skips can you complete in a row?

Challenge 2: Can you skip 5 times on your right foot and then 5 times on your left foot?

Challenge 3: Can you skip with high knees, one foot and then the other?

Challenge 4: Can you skip with? Jump with feet together on the first turn of the rope and then spread your feet apart on the second.

Charcoal	A drawing material made from burnt wood
Cross-hatching	Drawing lines crossed over and close together
Scribbling	Drawing lines in a fast and irregular way
Concertina	Folding something backwards and forwards so it becomes smaller but can be stretched out again.
Expression	Is the look on a face caused by how someone is feeling
Stippling	Making quick up and down hand movements to make dash and dot marks on paper
Illustrations	Showing a story using pictures
Illustrator	Someone who draws book illustrations
